

Collecting Data in Frio County for Community-Based Research

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Introduction

In order for us to be successful agents in improving the health of Frio County, we have found that we must connect with interested UTHSCSA researchers about the health priorities that are the biggest concern of the community and our capacity to conduct research.

Our group, the Frio Translational Advisory Board (TAB), learned that to attain the attention of researchers for our rural community, we need to provide data and the Institute for Integration of Medicine and Science (IIMS) has been a tremendous partner by putting forth the resources needed to assist us with the data collection.

In addition to IIMS, our collaboration with the School of Public Health- San Antonio Regional Campus and the South Central Area Health Education Center (AHEC) have provided us with a successful partnership in Community-Based Participatory Research (CBPR).

Materials and Methods

We have several methodology for gathering data in our county.

To begin, we asses the health priorities of the community by a wall survey collected at our annual Frio County Health Fair. Students from the School of Public Health assists us by gathering the data and analyzing it.

Following the analyzed data, we share our findings with the community leadership as well as the IIMS Community Engagement leadership to disseminate to researchers.

Other means of gathering data includes:

•Conducting focus groups with the help of the School of Public Health. •Recruit participants to studies and act as advisors to researchers on best methods for the project to be a success in our county.

All of the TAB members have access to the data and use it as needed. Our partners like Agri-Life Extension will use it to generate their own programs based on our community needs assessment and also for their quarterly reports. All of the data collected also helps us engage with our target audiences and identify the resources needed to improve the health of our community.
