

Practitioner Engagement in the South Texas Oral Health Network PBRN: A Network Analysis

CONCLUSIONS

- Maintaining a high level of engagement is important to PBRN infrastructures and shows more member interaction
- Different activities highlight which are more appealing to members and which need improvement
- Recruitment tactics need to further be explored (presenting at local organizations, tabling, community events, etc.)
